# 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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## 1.1 INTRODUCTION

Pune District Education Association(PDEA) is a well known educational Society founded by social reformers led by Late Baburaoji Gholap and has a standing of over 81 years in the field of education. PDEA has received, “Best Educational Institute Award” from the Government of Maharashtra for the remarkable achievements on 5th September 2000.

Anantrao Pawar College, Pirangut, was established in June, 2008 with inspiration of Hon’ble President Ajitdada Pawar,(Ex. Deputy Chief Minister of Maharashtra); to have the access to higher education especially for the girls and for the students who are economically backward and coming from rural & hilly remote areas of Mulshi Tehsil. College is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University Pune. The college offers multi-faculty degree courses in Arts, Commerce, Science, Computer Science, Computer Application and Master degree courses in Economics, Political Sciences, Chemistry, Commerce and Computer Science. The college has a spacious three floored spectacular building, Sophisticated Computer Laboratory with Internet Facility, Botanical Garden, Playground, Highly qualified & experienced Staff and many more facilities essential for HE institution.

College is located at the outskirts of Pirangut in Mulshi Taluka of Pune district.

- College Established in June, 2008 with the sanction of Government of Maharashtra and is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University Pune.
- Being a single college in the Mulshi tehsil, the college received hundred percent grants from Government of Maharashtra since its inception.
- It's a Grant-in-aid and Self Financing, Co-education, multi faculty institution functioning in regular dayshifts.
- It is a UGC recognized 2f(2013) and 12B(2015) institution.
- The college is managed by Pune District Education Association (PDEA) and monitored by College Development Committee(CDC).
- CDC has been constituted and functions as per guidelines of Maharashtra Universities act 2016.
- Located in a rural and hilly region having campus area of 19.85 Acres and 6155.26 sq ft ultra modern built up.
- Its a major driving force in the socio-economic development of people of Mulshi Tehsil.
- In the future, college will implement guidelines of NEP 2020.

## Socio-economic and Geographical conditions of the Mulshi taluka:

It is a high rainfall region in India characterized by hilly and undulating topography and less fertile soil. In spite of the very high rainfall in the region, Mulshi is agriculturally backward when compared to other talukas in Pune district. Paddy is the main rainy crop besides groundnut and vegetables, which are grown in some patches of this taluka. However, Mulshi continues to have poor irrigation facilities and less net sown area with a high percentage of fallow land as compared to other talukas. Rugged topography and medium coarse soils are responsible for this backwardness. Mulshi is one of 14 Talukas of Pune district. There are 145 villages and 2 towns in Mulshi Taluka. As per the Census India 2011, Mulshi Taluka has 38014 households, population of 171006 of which 90053 are males and 80953 are females. The sex-ratio of Mulshi Taluka is around 899 compared to 929 which is average of Maharashtra state. The literacy rate of Mulshi Taluka is 67.78% out of which 74.18% males and 60.66% females are literate. There are 10.58% Scheduled Caste (SC) and 4.34% Scheduled Tribe (ST) of total population in Mulshi Taluka. Out of the total population, 30% of the population lives in Urban areas and 70% in Rural. The total area of Mulshi is 1029.20 sq.km with population density of 166 per sq.km.

Under these Socio-economic condition, establishment of higher education institution was a desperate need and demand of population of this area. Pune District Education Association is a progressive democratic association which has its motto as '*Bahujan Hitay ;Bahujan Sukhay*', it means Welfare for Everyone of the Society. From the establishment of PDEA many social workers and educationalist were members of this association. With their visionary understanding and initiatives this College was established in pirangut village in 2008.

Mulshi region economy was mostly agricultural based , After 1990 due to proximity of the region to the historical and vibrant Pune city, the socio-economic demography is constantly changing. 4. Insufficient placement facility by departments for outgoing students.
5. Limited protection for cyber security issues.
6. Insufficient transport facility for students from Pirangut Bus stand to campus.

7. Lower student strength in some programmes.

## 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

### Curricular Aspects

- College imparts a curriculum designed and prescribed by Savitribai Phule Pune University (SPPU) and also self designed curriculum.
- College has well established curriculum development and delivery policy in practise.
- Two teachers were BOS members and participated in the curriculum designing process of the university.
- Curriculum pattern was changed from Annual pattern to CBCS from June 2019. Currently the institution offers fifteen UG, seven PG, two B.Voc. and one Ph. D. program.
- During the assessment period, the college introduced one Ph. D, five P.G., two B.Voc. and five diploma courses. (UGC-NSQF sponsored and approved by SPPU and State Government)
- College has published an exclusive book on value education concerns.
- Hands on training programmes are organized as per the requirement of some programs.
- College designed certificate, short-term, add-on courses. Thirty four (08-Certificate, 10 Diploma, 06-Add-On, 10-Short-Term) courses were successfully conducted. About thousand students benefited from these courses. These courses focus on the development of employability, entrepreneurship and communication skills among students. this aspects has insured academic flexibility across the programs.
- As a part of the curriculum, students participate in projects, field surveys, study tours, workshops and internships. college has developed a good inter institutional relationship with industry and commercial establishment nearby.
- About twentyfive percent wereengaged in Intership ,Field work and Projects. which supports learning skills and enhances employability.
- IQAC organized Teacher Training Programs/workshops on Innovative Teaching Pedagogies to strengthen the curriculum delivery mechanism.
- IQAC monitors the curriculum planning and delivery through well documentation process, it includes: academic calendars of the university and the college, teacher's diaries, online teaching platforms, journals, assignments result analysis, Academic and Administrative Audit and COs-POs
- The college has collaborations with various industries
- Cross Cutting issues like gender, professional ethics and Environment and Sustainability are discussed in the curriculum. Environment and Sustainability is a mandetory part of the curriculum
- Online feedback on curriculum, ambience ( infrastructure) and the academic performance of the institution is collected, analyzed, and Action Taken Reports (ATR) displayed on college website

- Modern online feedback software and mobile applications are being utilized.

### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

- Academic policy of our institution stresses upon value/skill based education. It also guides and monitors evaluation processes.
- Transparent admission process as per rules, regulations and guidelines of Savitribai Phule Pune University (SPPU) and Government of Maharashtra.
- Category reservations in admission process are governed as per state government regulations and instructions.
- Fee structure for reserved category students includes mandatory concession
- Counseling is provided and the transparency of the process is monitored.
- Average Student teachers ratio for five years is below 30:1.
- 34 full time teaching faculty (26 permanent, 08 temporary); 15 teachers have completed Ph.D.; 02 M. Phil.; 09 NET/SET qualified and 07 are pursuing Ph.D. About 50% are involved in active research.
- Teachers have participated in Refresher/Orientation, online FDPs required for career advancement. There are 15 trained non-teaching staff members too.
- The college has a robust and transparent evaluation system as evidenced by the functioning of the examination committee, the evaluation mechanism, the grievance redressal mechanism etc.
- OBE mechanism has been established with predefined POs/COs. Teacher training programmes, workshops and FDPs were organized for designing, mapping and attainment of COs-POs. Blooms Taxonomy methods are deployed and modern online attainment tools are utilized.
- The College follows the CBCS and adheres to the guidelines given by the SPPU. Remedial teaching for slow learners in some subjects. Advanced learners are guided to good practical knowledge by participating in competitions like Avishkar, elocution etc.
- The annual average pass percentage is at par with university results.
- Students centric participative, collaborative, peer teaching, role play, experiential learning methods- Kite festival, 'Ranbhajya Mahostav', Marketing fair etc are adopted. Tutor ward system is implemented
- Mentor mentee system is in practice which has helped resolving several socio economic issues of students.

- Student's development is achieved with the organization of various competitions like poster making, essay Writing, poetry, science exhibitions, study tours, field visits etc.

ICT based teaching learning is promoted, updates are made in methods of teaching learning, co-curricular and extracurricular activities promoted for the students' improvements.

Every year IQAC undertakes Students Satisfaction Survey using modern survey tools such as Surveyheart.

### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

- College has a well established written **Staff Research Incentives and Awards Policy**.
- College promotes the research culture among the faculty members and the students. For the promotion of research activity, a research committee has been established. It encourages and coordinates research programs.
- Research grants of Rs. 5.51513 (Rs. Five Lakh Fifty-One Thousand Five Hundred Thirteen only) Lakh from government and non-government agencies were sanctioned/received during the assessment period.
- The Research Centre in Commerce has been sanctioned since 2019-20.
- In Avishkar research competition 04 students have contributed at zonal level.
- Incubation cell creates a conducive environment for start-up culture and out of box thinking.
- Workshops, Conferences, Seminars were conducted related to development of skills and entrepreneurship among the students.
- Publications: 123 Research papers in UGC approved/Care list/Peer reviewed journals, 5 books, 2 chapters in books published and 4 papers published in national/ international conference proceedings.
- One patent application has been filed.
- 105 extension activities through NSS, Student welfare and Community and other committees encompassing health, environment and gender equality and kite festival to sensitize the students towards societal issues, health awareness that directly inculcates a value system. Ran Bhajya Mahotsav helps to develop entrepreneurship skills.
- Appreciations and awards received for extension activities from government / government recognised bodies.
- 10 functional MoUs which help students to understand and learn modern techniques and to set up their own start-ups. Collaborations and linkages are in place with Industries, Research institutes, University for faculties and students for knowledge exchange, Research, Guest Lectures, Visits, Publications etc.

- Own funding seed money projects carried out.
- Industrial projects has been carried out.
- While planning extension and out reach activities it is ensured that maximum number of students will be acomodated.

### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

- The 8.03 Hectare campus of Anantrao Pawar Institution is located in a rural, hilly area. The college has enough space for classrooms, labs, sports and other facilities. A playground, pathways, parking and gardens are also included in the college campus. Along with that college has approximately 5 acres of land available for cultivation of various crops.
- College has been constantly augmenting its infrastructure and physical facilities to enhance the quality of teaching-learning process.
- The classrooms, computer labs, conference hall and seminar rooms are IT-enabled with projectors and screens. The College has a fully functional website with essential attributes. The College has well-equipped computer labs with an effective student-computer ratio of 10:1.
- The College Library is partially automated with an open source Library Management System, ERP. The library subscribes to the N-List, DELNET, e-book reader.
- To Ensures proper access, Maintains, Secures and ensures legal and appropriate use of IT infrastructure in the campus. The Tech DIVINITY has developed and updated IT infrastructure in terms of Cloud Computing. The latest technology, like LAN, microphones and speakers to encourage productive conversation. 100 MBPS leased line is available and the college building is covered with WIFI zone.
- College has ultra modern Multimedia facilities required for creating animated e- content. The necessary editing software has been made available. Approximately 500 e-content units have been created by staff members.
- The college also takes pride in its comprehensive sports and fitness infrastructure. The outdoor sports facilities include a football court, kabaddi court, open space for yoga etc. Indoor arrangements include table tennis, chess, which is also used for taekwondo and wrestling. A fully equipped gymnasium with trained instructors and the latest exercise machines facilities in the college
- Additionally, a Canteen Committee makes monthly visits to the Canteen, keeping regular checks on the infrastructure, and conducting hygiene checks in the kitchen and related areas to ensure a qualitatively satisfactory food experience for our students
- The College has a contract for the maintenance of the rooftop solar plant including monthly cleaning by the company. College spends sufficient amount of funds for maintenance and cleaning of campus

## **Student Support and Progression**

- Students are the primary stakeholders of the institution and the institution has been evolving measures like student empowerment, inclusive practices and skill development which are student supportive and student centric.
- The institution has a student council which empowers students to participate in various academic and non-academic events, activities and sports.
- The Admissions and Grievances Committee addresses admission-related grievances of applicants. Anti-Ragging Committee ensures adequate awareness and immediate redressal of grievances, if any. The Internal Complaints Committee is vigilant regarding prevention of sexual harassment and provides a safe interface to the complainants.
- Students can direct any disciplinary issue to the Discipline Committee. The entire campus is under continuous CCTV surveillance.
- Students in SC/ST/OBC and other reserved category students receive financial assistance from the government. Institution provides concessions in the fees and installment facility to the students which are economically deprived.
- The institute organizes various capability enhancement programs for personality development, ICT skills and life skills.
- The institution also has an NSS, Sports, and Cultural Committee. Our performance in sports is peaking with higher participation of students in international, National, state level and University level participation. Students have won international, national, University level and State level prizes and participated in them.
- Career Guidance-Competitive Exam and Placement Cell actively promotes the development of the personality and career prospects of the students.
- The college has beautiful premises and well-developed facilities with modern technology, such as a library, ladies room, seminar hall, centralized public auditory mike system, botanical garden, computers and broadband internet facility, sports accessories, gymnasium, spacious playground, vehicle parking, canteen etc. And the solar energy plant fulfills the electricity needs of the premises.
- The institution has an alumni Association which helps to develop student's skills through the interaction with alumni.

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	National Education Policy (NEP) envisages to promote the potential of students through a holistic multidisciplinary or interdisciplinary mode of Education. In this concern, College Management has planned the road map to implement NEP regulations in its all programs. Our Teaching-Learning methods are composed of a blended combination of Intellectual, Scientific, Emotional, Social and Cultural development among its students. Along with regular CBCS courses the college conducts extra credit courses in different groups such as Physical Education, Scientific Survey, Field Visits, Cyber Security, Human Rights, Value Education, NSS, Earn and Learn, Avishkar Research Competition, Paper
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	<p>presentation at State, National/ International level by students etc. College also conducts workshops on Environmental Issues, Disaster Management, Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) and Gender Sensitization. In every Academic Program Students are allowed to select elective choice under the guidelines provided by affiliating university. Multidisciplinary Vocational Programmes (B.Voc.) Mass Communication and Journalism, Multimedia and Animation under NSQF-UGC have been introduced in the 2018-19. Five skill based Diploma Courses under NSQF-UGC have been introduced in the 2020-21. This initiative is helping the student community to gain employability skills. College is ambitious to offer a multidisciplinary flexible curriculum that enables multiple entry and exits. The provision for the same would be implemented according to the directives of the state government, Affiliating University and UGC guidelines. NEP workshop attended by principal at Principal meet organized by Savitribai Phule Pune University. Also one online MOOC course attended by Principal organized by Ramanujan College Delhi.</p>

Academic bank of credits (ABC):</p>	<p>Savitribai Phule Pune University (SPPU), The university to which our college is affiliated has registered under the ABC to permit students to avail the benefit of multiple entries and exit during the chosen programme, and to enable credit transfer. Our college has taken benefit of this scheme at max. Those students who have filled the University examination form have registered for ABC. For seamless collaboration, internationalization of education, joint degrees between Indian and foreign institutions, and to enable credit transfer, the college follows the guidelines issued by SPPU. Faculties are encouraged to design their own curricular and pedagogical approaches within the approved framework, including textbook, reading material selections, assignments, and assessments etc. by providing technical training and necessary hardware facilities such as Video Recording Room (Croma Room) and required processing software's. Almost all staff members have created their e content and made available it to our students through various platforms such as College APCP E-Content Google drive, Google forms, WhatsApp group, Telegram Groups, Google Classrooms, YouTube channels etc. Staff</p>

	<p>members are facilitated for remarkable contribution. The college created a help disk APCP and SPPU Examination Updates ( College Telegram Group) using Telegram app for smooth implementation of instruction delivered by affiliating University and UGC. All the circulars, registration guidelines and links were forwarded to all present students, We monitored the process of registration. Almost all queries were amicably resolved and therefore we could achieve the benchmark in ABC registration.</p>
<p>3. Skill development:</p>	<p>Anantrao Pawar College Pirangut, is focusing on skill development that enables students to acquire desired life skills and competency levels. The following diploma courses are conducted in the college to create employability among the students. 1. Bachelor of Vocation in Mass Communication and Journalism. 2. Bachelor of Vocation in Multimedia and Animation 3. Skill Based Diploma Courses such as Diploma in Fintech, Diploma in Organic Urban Farming, Diploma in Office Administration and Secretarial Practices, Diploma in Fruits Vegetable Drying / Dehydration Technician, and Diploma in Training Management. All these courses have been started in the college under the NSQF scheme of UGC. Soft Development Committee as well as Placement Cell, Career Guidance Cell are functioning in the college. Through them, various activities have been implemented for students on life skills, soft skills development, ICT skills, language communication skills. Some academic departments conduct many activities throughout the year for Reading, Writing, Listening and Speaking skills, Entrepreneur skills, business skills. All these activities play an important role in developing various skills among the students. Science departments conduct activities like soil testing, mobile repairing, and wild vegetable festivals. Students are encouraged to develop a variety of educational models. In addition, the institution provides capacity building programmes and skill inculcation training and Personality Development programmes to Undergraduate and Postgraduate students under the guidance of Placement and Career Counseling Cell. Skill oriented short term courses are offered in online and offline mode. Courses in all programmes are organized in such a way that students get opportunities for experiential learning</p>

	<p>and skill development through internships, fieldworks, industrial visits, projects works and hands-on learning methods. Every department offered two/three certificate/add on courses each additionally for employability and skill development. In order to provide value based education, the institution provides courses and events on professional ethics, research ethics, Indian constitution, life-skills and code of conduct. In addition, days of importance are observed to inculcate the values of truth, justice, peace, love and non-violence. In future while implementing recommendations of NEP 2020 more attention will be provided to introduce skill enhancement courses thereby we assure that our students will acquire various skills and competency.</p>

Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):</p>	<p>As the college is located in the rural area many students do not possess proficiency in English language for their help and support teachers have been offered a freedom to teach in the vernacular language into the curriculum both in online and offline courses. Across all programs in Arts and Commerce faculty most of the courses taught in Indian Languages. Already all our faculties have their mother tongue as Marathi and therefore are trained in the classroom delivery in the bilingual mode. In future for science faculty teachers we will be providing English Marathi subject dictionaries, Apps and software. B.A. Marathi, B.A. Economics, B.A. History B.A. Political Science. M.A. Economics, M.A. Political Science, B.Com. and M.Com. programs are taught in Indian languages and bilingual mode. In Arts programs Hindi subject is taught as a general subject in Indian language. The promotion of Indian languages, arts and traditions is also facilitated through competitions organized during the annual festival. <p>5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):</p>	<p>OBE is a student-centric model that emphasizes what is learnt rather than what is taught, which is the focus of traditional education. IQAC held three Workshops on outcome-based education (OBE). The college's whole faculty received OBE training. The courses were created using the OBE paradigm and included programme outcomes (PO), programme specific outcomes (PSO), and course outcomes (CO) that were all based on the training. In the training workshops teachers were trained to prepare a question bank on bloom's taxonomy. It enables the assessment of the students at cognitive levels namely remembering, understanding, applying, analyzing, evaluating and creating. In 2019 OBE was integrated into the curriculum. We conduct the student orientation programme to make aware of the COs and POs. COs and POs across all programs are hosted on the college website. Teachers have been provided attainment sheets in the Excel format.</p>

Distance education/online education:</p>	<p>All classes were held online during the COVID pandemic, Teachers have developed and delivered e-content, interactive PowerPoint presentations, and other online content using digital platforms like Google Forms, Google Classrooms, OBS (Open Broadcaster Software), Google Tools, Online Whiteboards, and YouTube. IQAC conducted the Workshop for faculty on use of Google Forms and Google Classrooms in Teaching and learning. Teacher Training Programs on ZOOM, Google Meet and Effective Teaching Strategies were organized. The College has made a proposal to affiliating University about the Satellite Centre and received acceptance. Through this center different programs will be delivered online. The college has introduced a skill based Five Diploma Vocational Course under NSQF-UGC. Most classes of these Diploma courses were held online during the COVID pandemic. - Every academic year, **Principal** conducts the **meeting** on planning of curriculum delivery and continuous internal evaluation. **IQAC** plays an important role in **planning of curriculum delivery** and its effective implementation.
- Departmental activity inputs help to prepare the **Academic and Activity Calendar** of the college. A **master Time-Table** is prepared by the committee; which considers the optimum use of the infrastructure for effective implementation of academic plans.
- For overall improvement of students; faculty **designs certificate, diploma, add-on and value-added courses**.
- The Principal, Vice-Principals, the IQAC, Heads of Departments and the Chairman of Time-Table Committee, **keep vigil on curriculum delivery**; this adherence helps the administration to reassure effectiveness.
- The **Covid-19 pandemic** situation was efficiently tackled with the help of technology. Academic years 2020-21 and 2021-22 were very challenging and uncertain in curriculum delivery. Regular classes, the internal exams, various class tests and the university exams were held in online mode.

**Delivery:**

- During the **Departmental meetings**, the Head of the department **allocates the courses to the teachers** considering their expertise in the specific area. **Faculty wise time-table** is prepared by the committee, as per university guidelines.
- Teachers prepare detailed yearly **teaching plans** according to the working days available for theory and practical.
- College conducts **Add-on, Skill based and Value-added courses** focusing on **Employability Enhancement and Entrepreneurship Development** of the Students, in order to assure student progression.
- Besides the **use of conventional methods**, various recent **online teaching methods** like **zoom meetings** and **Google meet** are adopted.
- **Participative methods** like: **Google Classroom, Google Forms, Quiz, Group Discussion, Demonstrations, PPT Presentations, seminars, projects, Industrial Visits, Assignments, Videos, use of charts and graphs**, are used for **effective curriculum delivery**.
- **Experiential learning** for the students through **internships, projects, and field trips** is specifically facilitated. Based on semester wise **result analysis** of every course; **corrective measures** are

suggested by **IQAC** and **remedial coaching classes** are undertaken if required.

- The **Knowledge Resource Centre** is equipped with **books and journals**; which helps students and teachers to **strengthen the teaching learning** process.
- Prescribed CIE processes are implemented and documented. Curricular feedback taken analysed and ATR documented.

#### **Documentation:**

- **Teacher's Diaries** play an important role in individual planning of a teacher. Teaching plan is a proper guide to execute curriculum in tune with the Academic Calendar, which is noted in the Teacher's diary.

**Cross Cutting issues:**

- We follow the curriculum designed and prescribed by the affiliated university for UG/PG programs. - Two of our teachers have been elected as **members to the SPPU Board of Studies ( BOS )** and have made special contributions to the Syllabus Design of B. Com & M. Com. programs. Senior faculty members of Arts and Science have formally/informally shared their suggestions with BOS members of SPPU for improvement in curriculum design.
- The college took care to concentrate on such issues and **organised special lectures, presentations, and many audits like: Green and Environment Audit, Energy Audit, Academic and Administrative Audit and Gender Audit**.
- In the syllabi of Savitribai Phule Pune University, **Environmental Awareness and Sustainability** is a compulsory course for all Second-Year classes. Arts stream courses related to Literature Incorporate **Broad Human Values** such as **Empathy, Peace, Brotherhood, Patriotism, Compassion** and Environment and Sustainability and courses other than literature; related to the Constitution of India focus on fundamental **Human Rights and Responsibilities of a citizen**, while courses related to the Commerce stream contain **Professional Ethics** in which topics are mainly related to **Business Management** and Team Spirit. Science stream courses particularly focus on Environment, **Soft Skills and Scientific temperament**.
- College has considered the need of local human resources and **introduced D.Voc. Courses** such as **Training Management, Office Management, FinTech, Vegetables/Fruits Dehydration**

**Technology and Organic Urban Farming.**

- **Personality developmental activities** are organised in tune with current needs of the local community.
- College has published an exclusive book on value education concerns.

Student centric methods used such as,

#### Experiential Learning:

- Science, commerce faculty programs have practical courses included in the syllabus. It engages students in **critical thinking, problem solving** and **decision making in contexts** that are personally relevant to them.
- College consciously encourages student's **participation in field trips**, industrial visits, **internships**, and **industrial training**. Field trips are arranged for students at Botanical, Zoological, geographical, historical places.
- Students from different departments **visit industries** such as sugar, chemical, food, agro and manufacturing industry as an hands-on-experience. Visits are arranged to research laboratories such as NCL, IISER, C-MET, etc.

#### Participative Learning:

- Teachers of our college act as facilitators and design different flexible strategies. **Hands-on training workshops** such as **Jam jelly preparation**, Flower arrangement, Basic of Microscopy handling, **Analysis by HPLC and AAS** etc. were arranged for students.
- **'Ranbhajya Mahotsav', Marketing fair, World Wildlife week, Marathi Rajbhasha Din, Marathi Samvardhan Pandharwada, Hindi Din, Periodic Table Competition, Plant and animal identification competitions, Student Seminars, Science Exhibitions** are arranged every

year for students in which they participate in different activities. In these activities different competitions are arranged for students which give platforms to express their talent.

- Participation in **environmental conservation** and to create awareness about changes in natural cycles. Opportunity is given to students to participate in different **community surveys**. Teachers arrange **group discussions** to engage students in a meaningful way and provide feedback.

### Collaborative Learning:

- In collaborative learning, **problem solving sessions** are arranged for students especially in science and computer science subjects. Problems are given in groups and step by step guidance given to them to solve the problems.
- Computer Aided materials, computer interfaced experiments, **virtual laboratories, google classrooms** are some methods used for collaborative learning. Due to use of these tools collaborations among students, teachers, and parents become easier.
- Students were motivated to **participate in the various competitions such as Avishkar, Elocution, poster presentation, Quizzes, competitive examination, cultural activities, Wall papers** etc.

### Use of ICT:

- The teachers of our college are combining technology with traditional mode of instruction to engage students in long term learning. College uses **ICT in education** to support, enhance, and optimize the delivery of education.

### The following ICT tools are used :

- LCD Projector, Desktop/Laptops, Printers, Scanners, Photocopier machines, Seminar Room established with digital facilities, Adequate Internet facilities, Auditorium, Online Classes through **Zoom, Google Meet, Microsoft Team, Google Classroom**, Teachers have established their own **youtube channels**, Physics, Zoology, Botany and Chemistry departments teachers are using **Wacom board on MS Onenote platform**.
- Faculties are encouraged to **use PPT's, e-content** in their teaching. Also equipped with digital libraries, online search engines and websites to prepare e-content.
- Faculties prepare **online quizzes** with the help of **Google Forms and surveyHeart**.
- Students are counseled with the help of Zoom / Google meet.
- Some teachers are using **OBS for recording** their online lectures.
- Various events such as **Poster making, Project presentations, Business quiz, Debates, paper presentations** etc. are being organized online.

## 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

### 2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

- The **internal assessment** is the key indicator to measure the performance of **academic progress** of students. Implemented **CBCS 2019 pattern** of evaluation.
- The college has an **examination committee** consisting of members from all faculties, looking into

all examination related activities. Committee prepares timetables for internal examination and evaluation of all programmes.

- Internal evaluation is conducted in a systematic manner by **displaying notices and seating arrangements**. P.G. and B. Voc. Programs, students have evaluated using **internal exams, seminars, presentations, home assignments, attendance** etc.. are used for internal assessments.
- In CBCS pattern **15- 35 marks pattern** was implemented for **Science and Computer science faculty** whereas **30-70 marks pattern** for **Arts and Commerce faculty** in semester way. In the **15-35 pattern**, 15 marks for internal assessment and 35 marks for External Assessment whereas in the **30-70 pattern**, 30 marks for internal assessment and 70 marks for External Assessment. In both these patterns, internal assessments through internal examination, seminars, presentations, home assignments, attendance etc. The **third year Science and Computer science** have **10-40 marks pattern** in which 10 marks for internal assessment which is carried out using internal Examination whereas **third year B. A. and B. Com. Course** has **20-80 marks** annual pattern in which 20 marks for internal assessment which is fulfilled by taking **Term end examination**.
- In academic year 20-21 with **covid-19 pandemic** situation most of the internal assessments were carried out via **online** using various **tools like Google Meet, Google Forms, and Zoom** etc.
- Internal assessments were **monitored** under observations of respective heads of departments and Principal. **Continuous internal evaluation of students** for every practice session on performed practical has been recorded and considered for internal credit
- College has a well defined **Evaluation Policy** in accordance with affiliating university. It ensures an establishment of mechanism to deal with internal as well as external examination related grievances. The **mechanism is transparent and efficient**. Most of the grievances are resolved in a stipulated time frame.
- The college examination committee has established the “**APCP & SPPU Examination’ telegram group** <https://t.me/+bxzSkcxQDPU2YWZI> administered by the Chief Examination Officer. Staff members and students of college are active members. In the pandemic situation this telegram group played an important role in dissemination of exam related information to the students.

#### Methodology applied to resolve exam related grievances:

1. The assessed internal test papers are shown to the students for self-assessment.
2. In case of any **grievances** regarding internal assessment, the student is free to interact with the teacher and get it resolved. The unresolved grievance, if any, is referred to the Vice Principal and Principal through the Head of the Department.
3. The grievances of the students with reference to assessment are made clear by showing his/her performance in the answer sheet.
4. With reference to evaluation at University level examination, if the student scores less marks than expected, he/she can apply for revaluation of his/her answer script after paying the prescribed fee.
5. University provides the **photocopy of answer sheets** to students regarding any grievances with reference to evaluation.

#### Response:

Most of the **course and programme outcomes are set and designed** by the Savitribai Phule Pune University, the college teachers have to redefine the PO-CO for each programme offered by the college. The specialization of concerned faculty is taken into consideration while altering some of the CO and PO's. In this process the scientific methods defined by **Bloom's Taxonomy** are deployed. **The curriculum of self-financed certificate courses and their programme outcomes are designed by the concerned department and CDC is required to sanction the same.**

Mechanism of communication: All the departments in our college conduct class orientation activity for making students aware about PO and CO for all the programmes offered. Also those are **stated and displayed on college websites and communicated to teachers and students.**

- **In the departmental meeting**, the discussion on these outcomes is made intentionally in the presence of the students.

The assessment of students in the light of POs, PSOs and COs is done regularly to help our faculty to know how well their students understand the various topics present in the course. The assessment of students provides feedback to the faculty and benefits in improving the teaching learning process. The students are informed about these outcomes in the **induction meeting** of the principal.

#### Attainment of Outcomes:

- The Program Outcomes (POs) and Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs) are accomplished through curriculum they are mapped to POs and PSOs.
- A Course Outcomes (COs) are defined for each course and the set of performance evaluation criteria is used for quantitative assessment of COs
- Thus the attainment of COs provides evidence of attainment of POs and PSOs.

#### Following are the different methods for Assessment, Evaluation and Measurement of POs/PSOs

- Direct Assessment methods:
- Indirect Assessment methods:

#### Direct Assessment methods :

- **Continuous Assessment:** COs are assessed through Sessional & Assignment Examinations, **Home Assignments** and **Lab records**. The **COs are mapped against each question and CO analysis is carried out by faculty** for each course and documented online on department drives. The contributions of COs are assessed in high, moderate and low levels, towards the attainment of POs/PSOs.

- **Semester-end Theory Examinations:** The questions in **semester-end examinations** are tested pertaining to all COs, in varying Bloom's Taxonomy Levels.
- **Laboratory Records:** Both continuous and semester-end examinations are conducted to test the COs attainment.

#### Indirect Assessment Methods:

- **Programme – Exit survey:** This survey taken from the final year students at the completion of their degree programme, stands as the comprehensive feedback for the PO/PSO assessment
- **Alumni Survey :** This survey is conducted annually with the Alumni to obtain the inputs and suggestions on PO attainment in the real time societal environment
- **Employer Survey:** This survey is taken from the employer to measure the PO attainments.

In addition, the institution takes the **Placement record and higher education details of the students** as supporting evidence for the assessment of POs.

**Response:**

- College has established an **Incubation Cell** (As per norms of **Centre for innovation, incubation and Linkages at SPPU**) in the year 2019-20. This incubation center provides great assistance to faculties and students.
- Incubation center provides basic research facilities and helps to **inculcate the scientific temperament** among the students. The center and the department guides the students **to avail advanced research facilities** at various prestigious institutes like **Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune (SPPU)**, National Chemical laboratory (NCL), etc. As an initiative of the incubation center, the faculty members undertook the **projects** based on various issues of Corona pandemic and completed with the help of seed money.
- College received **research funds** from prominent agencies like the **Board of Development (BOD)**, SPPU, **Science and Engineering Research Board (SERB)** and Industries, etc. By now, **one patent** has been filed by one of the faculty and the PhD student. We expect more such patents to be filed in the near future.
- College organizes **National and State level conferences/seminars and workshops**. It provides a platform for understanding the recent research work among the peers, helps to exchange knowledge between the faculties, researchers and students. The interaction among participants creates new groups to develop better ideas and expand the horizon for research work.

- SPPU organizes a prestigious college level research competition ‘**Avishkar**’. College arranges research competitions for the students. The winners at college level, participate in an intercollege research competition at university level. The students have to present and explain their research work in front of the experts of their respective fields. **Pune District Education Association (PDEA)** also organizes a ‘**PDEA Avishkar Competition**’ amongst the colleges of the institute, on the same lines as of the SPPU.
- College library is well resourced by research journals and reference books to facilitate and update the knowledge of research work. **INFLIBNET, e-Books, e- research journals** etc, are provided to the researchers for updating the recent developments in the relevant fields.
- College has **established various MoUs, collaborations and linkages** with **Research Institutes and Industries** to avail the facility and to expand the scope of research. The college has an MOU with Mesh Enterprises, Pune, and Flora Naturals, Pune, regarding Fruits, Vegetables Drying and Dehydration techniques and Bamboo farming techniques. Another MOU is with Stategee Consultancies, Pune, for various activities of the B-Voc department. MOU with RNV Biotech Pvt. Ltd., Mumbai, update the students about Renewable Energy, Bio and Agri Technologies. MOU with Abhinav Farms, Pune, to help students understand Organic Farming techniques.
- Incubation Center and MOUs help the students to be aware, understand and learn the modern technique and to set up their own **startups**. The Collaboration and linkages help the students to come across the latest research works and get hands-on practice. The overall college environment is research oriented and encourages research publications in reputed journals.

- College has well-ventilated **25 classrooms**. out of them **08 are ICT enabled** with projectors. Classrooms are spacious and provided with **boards, furniture** and **Wi-Fi/LAN** facilities.
- Principal's Office, Accounts and General Office constitute **Administrative Unit** of college and they are all **fully ICT enabled**.
- **Multi-Purpose Seminar Hall** serves as the venue for both academic events like conferences, seminars, presentations and student activities.
- **Croma Studio facility** is being used to produce e-content and record lectures.
- Departments have separate faculty rooms with desktops, printers and intercoms.
- **Examination cell** is equipped with **CCTV cameras**, printer, scanner, Xerox machines, computers, internet, Inverters etc.
- Under the **Diploma- Organic Urban Farming**, the college land is being used for cultivation of crops / vegetables.

##### Laboratories:

- There are **eleven laboratories** for UG and PG batches with optimum equipment facilities. The college has established an **incubation center** for enabling research
- Equipment like **Autoclave, Muffle Furnace, Incubator, Microwave Synthesizer, Rota Evaporator, PH meter** etc are made available.

##### Computer:

- **110 computers** on the college campus are available for students.
- **Two servers** have been installed for the smooth functioning of the office administration and library software

- **Solar plant** is installed on the Building terrace (**Capacity 10 kW**).
- **Rest room for girls and Ramp** for the **disabled students** have been provided.
- **32 CCTV cameras** have been installed in the premises of the college to safeguard the stakeholders.

#### Sports:

- Well-equipped **Fitness center** (Gymnasium), Space for indoor games like Chess, Carroms and Table Tennis caterers to the need of staff and students.
- **Gymnasium** has equipment facilities such as six and twelve station training equipment, power lifting set of 182.5 kg, 180 kg weight plates, 180 kg dumbbells, multipurpose benches etc

- **Governance and leadership of the institute** goes in tune with the vision and mission statements. The **Perspective plan** of the institute is prepared by the Management, CDC and IQAC. While preparing a plan, the priority is given to **vision and mission statements**. The college has a **College Development Committee (CDC)** formulated according to **Maharashtra University Act 2016**. It acts as a link between the **PDEA management** and the college. The CDC consists of Management, the Principal, Members of the Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff, Alumni, and Prominent Personalities from the Society, Industry, and Educational Institutions. Meetings of CDC are held regularly to discuss matters related to the development of the college with focus on student and faculty development. **IQAC established in the college** plays a pivotal role at academic and administrative level. Different **Academic committees** involving teaching, non teaching staff and student representatives are formed in the college to look after different types of activities, approved by IQAC on the bases of feedback.
- The **college administration is decentralized** through the Principal, Vice Principals, Head of the Departments, Faculty members, Office Superintendent, Committee Chairmen, Members and Office staff . and role of each one is clarified. The Principal leads the CDC's meetings to formulate **policies and action plans** to achieve its **vision and mission**. The Governing Body seeks college community and stakeholder feedback on policy formulation and execution. Departments prepare their action plans and IQAC approves them, forming part of the college **strategic plan**. The concerning Head along with the team is responsible for successful implementation of the plan. Consistently, the **quality aspects are monitored by IQAC** of the College.
- **The faculty members are provided with opportunities** to lead as **teacher-in-charge, convener and coordinator** of different assignments of the academic nature. This throws open before them an opportunity to develop themselves as leaders by undertaking academic and non-academic assignments.
- **The non teaching staff are actively involved in all the activities of the college** and given representation in the various academic committees. The office superintendent has given liberty to take up innovative initiatives so as to bring change in administration and lead the technological interventions etc.

- The College has always been proud of the **leadership abilities** develop among its students. The **NSS activities** are mostly guided by leadership Principles in which the officer and the student group leaders get the opportunity to manage activities such as **Cleanliness Drives, Cultural Activities and Social events and experiment with the Management Skills**. - Benefit of Loan Security Scheme, under which all the remaining loan amount is wave off on demise of the staff.
- Teaching and non- teaching staff are members of **Sevak Kalyan Nidhi** which financially supports all members and spouses during natural calamity and disaster.
- Teaching faculties are **felicited on completing M. Phil, Ph.D. degrees** and **publications of Books, Research Papers** etc.
- **COVID-19 vaccination drive** is arranged for all staff members.
- **All class IV non-teaching staff members are provided uniforms.**
- **Staff Welfare Committee** organizes Awareness promoting lectures on Health issues, **Finacial Literacy, Stress management and Art of living,** also **organizes Field Trips, Birthday Celebrations, Welcome , Retirement Farewell Programmes** etc. Staff members contribute for urgent **financial support** to the family members on the demise of the staff.

#### **Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff-**

College has been implementing **Performance Apraisal Policy** for teaching and non-teaching staff.

- **Teaching staff :** As part of the **Academic Audit**, teachers are required to submit a **teaching plan** every semester in order to ensure the timely implementation of the **academic plan** proposed at the start of the academic year. Faculty members are also evaluated based on the various responsibilities bestowed upon them as part of **extracurricular and extension activities.** At the end of the academic year, all teachers submit a duly completed proforma of the **performance-based appraisal system (PBAS)** to IQAC. **IQAC evaluates teacher performance and recommends corrective measures.** On an annual basis, the Principal submits a **confidential report about teachers** to the Management. The Management evaluates those reports thoroughly and provides encouragement, suggestions for improvement and appropriate corrective measures in a confidential manner.
- **Non-teaching staff -** The well established performance appraisal system for non teaching staff is practiced through **confidential reports.** Every non-teaching staff member has to submit a confidential report to the Principal which is forwarded with recommendations to the Management of PDEA for review and evaluation.
- Regarding the promotions of non-teaching staff members in their services the procedures set by

**Government of Maharashtra** are implemented. Promotion proposals are forwarded to **Joint Director Higher Education, Pune** region for approval.

### **College conducts financial audits (internal and external) regularly**

The College has evolved an effective Financial and Accounting System with sound control mechanisms and accountability. **The institution conducts external and internal audits for both Government and Non-Government funds regularly.** Separate auditors are appointed by the management for internal and external audits to bring out accurate and complete disclosure of the financial results and to relate performance/productivity against financial information.

**1. Internal Audit** is carried out annually by the internal auditing team appointed by the management to ascertain whether the Management policies and guidelines for accounting are properly implemented. They verify bills, vouchers, receipts, cash books, cheque registers etc. Objections if any are asked to be rectified within the stipulated time. **Concurrent Auditing** is also done regularly for the self-finance of accounts and necessary rectifications are made based on their observation.

### **2. External Audit**

- **Statutory Audits by the Chartered Accountants** are conducted annually by the Chartered accountants duly appointed by the Management.
- **External Audit for grants received from government is conducted by Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Maharashtra.** Auditors analyzes all the registers and accounts

of the college.

- **External Audits for UGC Funds** are conducted at regular intervals. The college conducts an external financial audit for all the grants received from UGC.

### 3. Audit Objections and Rectifications

The audit objections are rectified by the accounts department and a report with explanation is submitted to the Principal. The **Action Taken Report** is also sent to the auditor for final approval.

## 6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

**6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities**

### Response:

It has been one of the primary concerns of **IQAC** to adopt practices, which will provide quality education to the students through an effective and meaningful teaching-learning process. IQAC plays an instrumental role in enhancing the **quality of the academic and co-curricular endeavors** of the College.

IQAC achieves this through following practices, viz.,

**1. Conducting External Academic and Administrative Audits (AAA)** - College made to do a **SWOC Analysis** of their performance. Audit is based on results, research projects, effective curriculum implementation, Co-curricular and extra curricular activities, **use of ICT**-related pedagogical methodologies, functioning of various academic committees and administrative details. It makes recommendations to the college to do self-evaluation and to set higher goals to meet new challenges.

2. IQAC took **review of Teaching Learning** activities and discussed it in IQAC meetings.

**3. Collecting Feedback from Stakeholders** like Students, Parents, Teachers and Alumni to facilitate teaching-learning reforms. This helps in obtaining an unbiased and honest opinion about the institutional performance especially in academics. Student feedback of teachers is conducted regularly. A careful analysis of the feedback received is done and communicated to the teachers to enable them to enhance their teaching skills and their relationship with the students.

Based on the information received due to implementation of the above two practices, IQAC has been able to develop a system for conscious, consistent and catalytic action to bring about **reforms in teaching-learning process, structure, methodologies and learning outcomes.**

**Following areas where these reforms are reflected are as follows:**

- Workshop on **Attainment of Programme Outcomes**, Programme Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes.
- IQAC suggests **innovative pedagogical methodologies** like **Power Point Presentations, Projects, Field Trips, Role Plays, Workshops, Videos.** in addition to the completion of curriculum through Assignments, Class Tests, Tutorials.
- All staff members have been trained to **use online teaching platforms** such as **Google Meet, ZOOM, Google Classroom, Google Docs and Forms, Effective teaching Strategies, ICT tools** etc. Staff members have been created e-content and made it available to the students.
- IQAC ensures and instructs department and staff members for strict followup of continuous internal evaluation across all programs. It monitors the **progress, grievances and submission of internal marks on university portal** in stipulated time frame.
- IQAC promotes the **culture of Research** amongst students through **Avishkar competition and staff** through **Seed Money Projects.**
- Departments are encouraged to organize **Conferences and Seminars** on themes relevant to educational needs and futuristic growth of the students.

- In the last five years, after accreditation (NAAC Ist Cycle) **Certificate Add-on courses, two B.Voc (Bachelor of Vocational), five D.Voc. & Five PG courses (M.Sc. Analytical Chemistry, M.Sc. Physics, M.A. Economics, M.A. Political Science, M.A. History) have been introduced.**
- IQAC facilitates the **Career Advancement Schemes(CAS)** for permanent teachers, Proposals are requested. After scrutinization of documents, verification and validation of proposals, IQAC/ College forwards the proposals to the concerned authorities.

## 7.2 Best Practices

### 7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

#### Response:

#### 1. Title of the practice:

### **DEVELOPING ENTREPRENEURSHIP SKILLS AMONG STUDENTS**

#### **Aim:**

- To develop self-awareness, self-reliance among the students and empower them for self-employment/ entrepreneurship.

#### **Objectives:**

- To create awareness about facets of entrepreneurship
- To highlight the merits of pursuing Self-employment
- To train the students in the essentials of conceiving, planning, initiating and launching an economic activity successfully

#### **The Context**

Students of the rural area feel uncertain about their career options and they show least concern in entrepreneurship because of family or social background. The practice was initiated for providing a platform to the students in order to inculcate the skills of entrepreneurship.

#### **The practice:**

At the beginning of the academic year the tentative dates of 03 different events namely 'Marketing fair', 'Wild vegetable food festival' (Ranbhajya Mahotsav) and 'Sharada kite festival' are proposed. Accordingly the committees are formed and duties are assigned. The schedule is displayed on notice boards and circulated among the stakeholders. Women self-help groups (WSHS) in the vicinity of the college are also invited. Committee members analyze the registration details and plan. Necessary infrastructure and basic amenities are provided. The office bearers of PDEA, faculties from other colleges and renowned personalities, alumni, students and parents are involved in the event as possible customers. The prominent entrepreneur alumni are invited as guests of honor to inspire the students. The students and WSHS are assisted in the installation of their stalls. Stall holders are encouraged to use QR codes for transactions. Students are enabled to analyze the shortfalls which they try to overcome in the next event.

#### **Event details are:**

### **Wild vegetable food festival (Ranbhajya Mahotsav):**

Local people believe that the wild vegetables growing during and after the rainy season possess medicinal properties. To extend the benefit of the local biodiversity over to the urban population, this activity is organized. During this festival students prepare locally available and seasonal wild vegetables with their native recipes, explain the nutritional contents and medicinal properties to the visitors and also sell the raw vegetables and cooked vegetable dishes. The Agricultural and Forest Department, Government of Maharashtra also endorsed this activity.

### **Marketing fair:**

This activity is open to all the students, especially Commerce and BBA (CA) students are the main participants. It provides a platform to the students to experience the product preparation, promotion and sale. Students sell cooked food dishes, cereals, pulses, spices, grains and locally available food items including organically grown 'Indrayani rice'.

### **Sharada Kite Festival:**

This event is open to all. It is a combination of Culture, tradition, Sport, entertainment and marketing of a variety of kites and food. This outdoor event is organized with a view to provide youth with opportunity to aspire for greater heights. It introduces the cultural heritage of India.

### **The evidence of success:**

- Enthusiastic Participation of stakeholders and their response.
- Increasing participation of Women self-help groups.
- Effective sale of food and goods during the event.
- Assured Skill development through first-hand experience
- Provides a platform for Folk arts and artists.

## **2. TITLE OF THE PRACTICE:**

## **Fostering the sense of social responsibility among the staff and students**

### **AIM:**

Sensitising the students regarding various social issues ranging from Local to the Global. The students should be able to understand the complexity of the issues with compassion and try to bring the transformation.

### **OBJECTIVES:**

- To develop a sense of social and civic responsibility.
- To identify the social problems and resolve them responsibly
- To build leadership qualities and develop democratic attitudes.

### **THE CONTEXT:**

- Today we are globally and virtually connected through social media. We have lost social connectivity. To restore this lost connection, the college has been taking initiatives by organising activities.
- The students are encouraged to take initiatives to restore the environment by creating awareness. Blood, plasma and organ donation drives are organised to strengthen the relation between an individual and the society and to inculcate empathy and compassion.
- Students are groomed to be responsible citizens by knowing the constitution, their fundamental rights and encouraged to vote and promote voter awareness in the society.

### **THE PRACTICE:**

College had adopted Pirangut, Kharawade and Mukaiwadi- the villages in Mulshi Tehsil. UG and PG students of our College dwelling in these villages were the target group.

Following are the activities conducted:

#### **1. Collection of Ganesha Idols, Hartalika and Pooja Nirmalya:**

The villagers from Pirangut, Mukaiwadi and Kharawade during Ganesh Festival, immerse idols of Ganesha, Gauri and Hartalika and Pooja Nirmalya into nearby water bodies causing water pollution. The awareness program was conducted to educate them regarding the water pollution caused by the chemical paints used and the plaster of paris. They are encouraged to go for Shadu Murti (idols) instead of Plaster of Paris. The college staff and students collect idols and the Pooja Nirmalya. We dispose of this material scientifically.

#### **2. Health and Hygiene:**

In the rural part there are myths and misconceptions regarding health and hygiene, organ donation etc. College took initiatives to eradicate those by undertaking Blood donation and health check-up Camp, Organ Donation Awareness Program, Covid Awareness Program for tribal people and Plasma donation campaign activities.

### 3. Awareness Programmes:

Students are groomed to be responsible citizens by undertaking Polling Awareness Rally, Flood relief rallies, Constitution Day celebration, Clean and Healthy India Campaign, Preparation and Distribution of Masks to local community, Helping activity by NSS Corona Warriors etc. activities.

**4. Surveys:** Social and Economic survey of Kharawade village and Gram Vikas Survekshan of Kharawade Village was carried out on 23rd December 2019 by NSS students ( Participants- staff 5, students 15).

### THE EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS:

- Most of the students and Villagers give ganesh and other idols to the collection sites for immersion.
- One of our faculty member Prof. Vijay Randive donated the plasma during COVID Pandemic.
- Fund collection for Kerala floods Rs 25K and handover to affiliating University.

## 7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

**7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust**

**within 1000 words**

**Response:**

The College is situated in the hilly and rural part of Mulshi Tehsil, which is one of the **mega biodiversity** hotspots of India. Most of the students come from agricultural and economically weaker backgrounds. So, there is a need to make them aware about the **prosperity of their native place and tap opportunities of self-employment.**

**Anthropogenic activities** have caused tremendous impact on the environment and agriculture. Accordingly, there is a need to conserve the natural resources and use them **sustainably for livelihood activities.**

The distinctiveness is in accordance with our Vision and Mission which is **“Creating awareness about environment and conservation of biodiversity through sustainable development for generating opportunities of self-employment”.**

The distinctiveness is achieved through a series of actions as follows:

#### **1. Awareness activities:**

Awareness programs were conducted to get acquainted with the importance and value of the existing landscapes, water resources, flora and fauna of Mulshi. Guest lectures of eminent scientists and biodiversity experts were arranged to acquire technical guidance. **Dr. Stefan Porembaski, Scientist, Rostock University, Germany** delivered a lecture **“ Inselbergs”** on 1st Sept. 2018.

Hon. **Dr. Sachin Punekar**, President of Biospheres, a non-government organization working for conservation of biodiversity, enlightened the students on **‘Biodiversity of Mulshi’** and its importance. Secondly, **Pledge for environmental protection** was taken by the staff and students on 14/10/2021.

An **eradication drive** of ‘Cosmos sulphureus’ an exotic weed and **collection of plastic waste** on the Lavasa Link road was successfully carried out regularly in collaboration with Bank of Maharashtra, Lavale and Pirangut Gram Panchayat and villagers.

In collaboration with various NGOs environmental awareness related activities were carried out to **reduce, reuse and recycle** waste material to propagate the idea of reducing pollution and threat to environment at an individual level.

**‘Plant identification competition’** is organized for the students in order to increase their awareness about plants and their use in day-to-day life.

During the **NSS camps** in different villages, awareness is created regarding **residue free agri produce and its demand in urban areas.** Importance of local varieties of Pulses and Cereals and their seed is also highlighted.

**2. Surveys:** Historical, geographical and Plant surveys of the villages in Mulshi Tehsil were carried out to make students understand more about their native place, its socioeconomic condition and how this impacts

the regional biodiversity. The first hand data collected was processed and analyzed. The college has also identified some places with tourist potential.

**3. Biodiversity Spectrum:** Scientific studies were carried out in the adjoining villages to understand the floral diversity. **Students published a research paper in Journal of Medicinal plants.**

**Dr. R. B. Bhagat** worked on a **major research project** entitled “**Floristic Vegetation and Species Diversity in Mulshi Water Shade Catchment Area**” funded by **Science Engineering Research Board (SERB)** with an objective of exploring the rich biodiversity and detailed floral study of the area. Based on this extensive research of the rich biodiversity, a book was published entitled "**Floristic Diversity of Mulshi Northern Western Ghats**".

Based on this study, she presented a **research paper** in **International Botanical Congress (IBC) held at Schenzhen, China.**

#### **4. Training to Conserve biodiversity:**

In order to know the appearance of plants in the field, a small **Herbal garden** is also established in college in which a few **aromatic and medicinal plants** are planted.

Various techniques were taught to the students for conservation of plant diversity, including various **training programmes for stakeholders**. In-house faculty conducted a **workshop on ‘How to prepare Herbarium’** wherein students prepared herbarium of the plants collected from the different parts of Mulshi Tehsil.

#### **5. Sustainable use of natural resources and livelihood activities:**

**‘Ganesh Patri Udyan’:** The puja forms an important part of ‘Ganesh Festival’, where 21 varieties of leaves (patri) are used to worship Lord Ganesh. There is an alarming situation over the use of rare and endangered plant species of Western Ghats as part of the ‘Ganesh Puja Patri’. Most of them are illegally collected that are not included in any of the puja rituals (vidhi). The excessive use of endangered plants is throwing the conservation ethic in the Ghats astray, these include plants like wild turmeric, mahalungi and screw pine.

To create awareness about original plants and their role in puja, a Ganesh Patri Udyan was established in college on 18 Jan. 2021. It was also observed that there is a market of original puja leaves in metropolitan cities. Accordingly, students were trained and now they are selling original puja patries in Pune and its suburbs. It is developed as a source of income for our students. Now they can grow or sustainably harvest naturally growing plants which are used during various festivals and worships.

**Eco-tourism:** College encourages students to be self-employed by considering ecotourism as one of the best option because Mulshi has scenic beauty and is a favorite tourist destination. ‘Girivan’ is the most popular and favorite ecotourism center located in Mulshi. College **signed MoUs with ecotourism centers** in Mulshi to provide internships to interested students. Students of our College **Amit Gole** owns a peacock farmhouse at Lavale, Pirangut and **Rahul Pawar** runs a holiday resort ‘Atharva Residency’ at Girivan, Mulshi. Around twenty students from our college are presently engaged in this field.

**Agro-tourism:** College caters the needs of the students enabling them to be self-employed in the field of

agro tourism. **Pratik Bhumkar** owns ‘Mulshi Agritourism’ Near Bhare Bridge, Ambadwet, Mulshi. Around ten students from our college are presently engaged in this field.

**Organic farming:** Programs were conducted for students to understand the use of biofertilizers, green manures and biopesticides. **Workshops and Add On Courses** were offered for students in order to understand the importance of soil conservation, harmful effects of chemical fertilizers and pesticides on crops and human health. Moreover, in the academic year 2020-21 we **introduced Diploma course in Organic Farming , Fruit and vegetables Drying /Dehydration Technician,** These courses are running successfully.

These consistent efforts resulted in enhancement of awareness about regional biodiversity and helped to generate opportunities of self-employment . It has created an unique and distinctive identity.
